The following is the text of a letter from Dr. H.J. Greenwood, Head of the Department of Geological Sciences, University of British Columbia to Dr. Igor L. Khodakovsky of the USSR Academy of Sciences.

Dear Professor Khodakovsky:

As you know I had intended to take part in the International Symposium "Thermodynamics of Mineral Formation" to be held within the framework of the International Geological Congress in Moscow August 1984. However, it is with considerable regret that I must write now to say that I feel I can no longer look forward to enjoying a visit to Moscow. My change of mind has been occasioned by the recent shooting down of an unarmed Korean passenger plane by Russian military aircraft.

While I realize perfectly well that this deplorable incident could not have been prevented by the scientists of the U.S.S.R. nor can they be expected to bear any of the blame, I still find that my personal revulsion at this incident is such that I can not bring myself to travel to Moscow. It is my hope that other scientists will feel similarly and that by making this feeling known to members of the Russian Scientific community some internal pressure may be brought to bear within the U.S.S.R. to prevent this kind of behaviour.

I write with regret because I had hoped to meet some of you, but I am afraid I shall not be visiting Moscow.
