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W.J.C. Cherwinski teaches history at Memorial University of Newfoundland. His previous articles have appeared in the *Canadian Historical Review*, the *Journal of Canadian Studies/Revue d'études canadiennes*, and *Labour/Le travailleur*. He is preparing a monograph on prairie farm labour before the Depression.

C. Rod Day received his B.A. from Stanford and his M.A. and Ph.D. from Harvard. He has been teaching at Simon Fraser University, where he is now an associate professor, since 1966. During the past several years, he has published a series of articles on French education in English, Canadian, and American books and journals.

Peter DeLottinville completed his M.A. in History at Dalhousie University and worked as a research assistant in Ottawa on nineteenth-century Ontario working class history with funding from the Ontario Historical Studies Series. He is now employed in the Manuscript Division, Public Archives of Canada.

Julian Gwyn is Professor of History at the University of Ottawa, where he has taught since 1961. Between 1972 and 1979, he was associate editor of *Histoire sociale-Social History*. He is author of *The Enterprising Admiral. The Personal Fortune of Admiral Sir Peter Warren* (1974), and he has edited *The American Manuscripts in the Gage Collection* (1971), *The Royal Navy and North America . . . 1736-1752* (1975), and *La chute de Louisbourg . . . 1745* (1978).

Royden Harrison, M.A., D.Phil., is Professor of Social History and Director of the Centre for the Study of Social History, University of Warwick. He is the co-founder in 1960 and remains co-editor of the *Bulletin* of the Society for the Study of Labour History. Aside from many books and articles already published, he is the authorized biographer of Sidney and Beatrice Webb, and a Fellow of the Royal Historical Society.

Herbert J. Mays teaches history at the University of Winnipeg. His articles have appeared in the *Canadian Historical Review* and *Histoire sociale-Social History*. His current research focuses on the history of the family in Canada and the early settlement of Manitoba.

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Barbara C. Murison is a doctoral candidate at the University of Western Ontario. She has written for the *Journal of Imperial and Commonwealth History* on Upper Canadian history and is now investigating politics and administration in England and the Atlantic colonies, 1675-1707.

James Pitsula teaches Canadian history at the University of Regina. His articles have appeared in the *Journal of Canadian Studies* and *Saskatchewan History*; he is now studying social welfare and social work in Toronto from 1880 to 1930.
