A frequent contributor to *Acadiensis*, Jack Bumsted is a member of the history department of Simon Fraser University.

Eric Sager teaches history at Erindale College, University of Toronto and Louis Fischer at the Cornerbrook campus of the Memorial University of Newfoundland. Both were members for several years of the Maritime History Group at Memorial.

Author of several articles on the Cape Breton working class, Don Macgillivray teaches history at the College of Cape Breton.

For most of the time since completing his M.A. in medieval history at Queen's University, C.R. McKay has been an English teacher in Lockeport, Nova Scotia.

E.R. Forbes teaches at the University of New Brunswick and has recently published *The Maritime Rights Movement, 1919-1927: A Study in Canadian Regionalism*.

Graeme Wynn is an historical geographer at the University of British Columbia and the author of a number of papers on the Atlantic region.
